### SCT MASTERCLASS WITH MATTHEW SAMPSON

Apprenticeships, a system of training which the government is keen to expand, enable young people to gain real, practical skills by "learning while they work", which are much-desired in the equine industry. #### APPRENTICESHIP WITH HANNAH ESBERGER-HANCOCK



James York, 18, is undertaking his Level Two Apprenticeship while working for international dressage rider Hannah Esberger-Hancock at her Sheffield yard. He started his SCT apprenticeship with top showjumper Matthew Sampson in 2014, and has since spent time with renowned event horse producer and trainer Judy Bradwell, before coming to work for Hannah this summer. "I have always been interested in working with horses, and left school after my GCSEs," he says. "I was keen to learn in a practical way, rather than in a classroom, and the apprenticeship really suits me as I am gaining a really wide knowledge base from people who have great expertise in their fields. SCT have always been there when I needed advice and support." James, who events at British Eventing novice level, hopes to run his own yard one day. Pauline Esberger, who helps her daughter Hannah run their highly successful dressage



yard, says: "Both our apprentices, James and Fern Carroll, are fabulous -dedicated and keen to learn. For me, apprenticeships are all about young people who need a leg-up and who really want to learn and succeed. It's an excellent scheme - we get great back-up from SCT, and it encourages them to progress with their learning, both practically and theoretically. There's a lot of satisfaction for employers in helping young people who want to learn."

#### HOPE PASTURES - RESCUE AND REHABILITATION CENTRE - SOPHIE KENDRICK



I have the Job of Yard Manager for Hope Pastures which is an Equine Rehabilitation Centre in Leeds. I have worked at the rescue centre for 15 years now, and my job is very diverse. It involves rescuing the equines, including travelling them, putting them in quarantine and arranging vets, farrier and physios when needed. It involves keeping accurate and professional records of their health and behaviour too. We also re-home horses so my job involves home checking, corresponding with potential loan owners,



transporting ponies to their new homes etc. We have resident horses, ponies and donkeys on site and also an old mule! His name is Muffin and he is an interesting animal to work with, nothing like a donkey or a pony. These residents all have specific health needs and behavioural issues. My job includes devising training schedules, ensuring that routine farrier care and vaccinations are all kept up to date, that they are groomed, fed and stabled appropriately. I have the task of pasture management which includes the annual resting, re-seeding and fertilising of the fields, ensuring that poisonous plants are removed and that the fields are kept in good order. We are a charity so we rely heavily on public donations so we welcome visitors on site every day, we are open from 10-3pm and run events where visitors can meet the ponies and learn more about them, so my job also involves working with the public and educating people too. As you can imagine, having had no formal training within the equine industry, the need for me to develop my skills was extremely important. As Hope Pastures has grown, so have the amount of equines that we need to manage, this is over 100 animals at the time of writing! I have just completed my Advanced Apprenticeship with Stubbing Court Training and I have found the training to be crucial to the improvement of standards on the yard. The horses' health problems are easier and quicker to notice, the paperwork involved with each animal is more accurate and up to date



too. I am more knowledgeable about transporting equines, quarantining them and managing their routines and diets. All of the things I have learned from my Advanced Apprenticeship have had a positive and direct impact on Hope Pastures, which in turn means that the rescued ponies, horses, donkeys and mule have a better standard of care, all thanks to Stubbing Court.

Aspect 2: What was the most enjoyable aspect of the day? • Jumping bigger fences • Having positive feedback from a well known rider • Seeing the apprentices enjoying jumping • Spending quality time with my apprentice • Having a lesson from Matt and getting to ride a different horse. Also being able to watch different horses and riders • Jumping higher than I have before • Being challenged with the course of jumps and Matthew helped my horse improve her confidence • Watching the apprentices • Jumping the horse I was given • Helping with the lessons • Taking the apprentices out of the yard for the day • Being able to ride in the Masterclass • Meeting everyone at the Masterclass • Was really enjoyable and had fun • Jumping full courses • Seeing learners enjoying their lessons and improving throughout • Seeing my daughter learn from her experiences • Seeing our horse jump well!! • Learning and watching the horses and trainees riding • Watching the apprentice ride and seeing them improve throughout the session • When the jumps went up and I finally relaxed • All the young horses behaved • Jumping round a full course • Seeing my trainees ride and identify their abilities when amongst other riders • Meeting the lovely people from SCT • Being able to watch Matt give a lesson • Seeing the huge improvements in riding and horses in such a short space of time

Aspect 3: What will you do now to improve your work and progress? • Gaining confidence • Keep practicing and work towards Level 3 • Using his tips and advice • Take Matthew's comments into my riding and training at home • Continue to reinforce and develop areas outlined by the trainer and half halt and release rather than hold • Work on my approach when riding towards a jump and also in a double • Carry on jumping and putting what I have learnt to good use • Continue jumping courses to improve my mare's confidence • Work on keeping a good pace and straight at a fence • I will look at setting up my own course with the correct strides • Given me pointers to help the apprentices • Work now on my jumping position and approach to fences • Jump more and improve on seeing a stride • Practicing my jumping position on different horses • Practice at home more • Do what Matt suggested • Tell more apprentices about the Masterclasses and encourage them to ride in them • Try and attend another Masterclass and learn to relax on new horses • Carry on with the skills that Matt has given me for training a young horse • Keep my leg on • Maintain standards • Encourage all the apprentices to attend the Masterclasses, as they have a wonderful learning opportunity available for them • More canter transitions to get horses listening to me • Encourage future attendance at Masterclasses - for aspiring trainers, apprentices and employers
